
The next time you have any coins, take a closer look at them.

What is money and where does it come from?

Money is needed to buy items for everyday living, such as food to eat, pay bills or to pay for the home we live in.

Money can be coins or notes, but also our parents and other adults can use a special plastic card called a *debit* or *credit* card to pay for items in the shops or online.

Most people earn their money by getting paid to do a job. Other people might receive special money from the government called benefits if they don't go to work.

What is gambling?


